



RISK PERCEPTIONS ON MEDICAL MARIJUANA: A GLIMPSE OF MALAYSIAN ADULTS



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INTRODUCTION

Marijuana, derived from the Cannabis sativa plant, is a popular substance with various slang names and is consumed through different methods and is able to give effects. Measuring perceptions of the potential risks associated with marijuana use is a useful method to predict future usage, as it has proven to be a reliable predictor in the past.

Decriminalisation, the removal of criminal sanctions while maintaining legal restrictions, is considered an alternative approach to drug-related issues and many countries have adopted decriminalisation strategies tailored to their contexts. The decriminalisation of medical marijuana involves granting legal access to patients based on evidence. However, the longterm effects of medical marijuana use among vulnerable populations require further investigation.

OBJECTIVE

To identify the perception of health risk related to medical marijuana use

METHODOLOGY

Study Design: Cross-sectional study using an online survey

Sampling Technique: Snowball sampling technique

Study Population: Malaysian who are 18 years and older, including users and nonusers of marijuana

Inclusion Criteria: Aged 18 and above, have access to the internet, and are able to understand Malay or English language

Sample Size: 2,047 people

Looks at **4 conditions** which are: (harmful, addictive, mental health risk, and physical health risk)

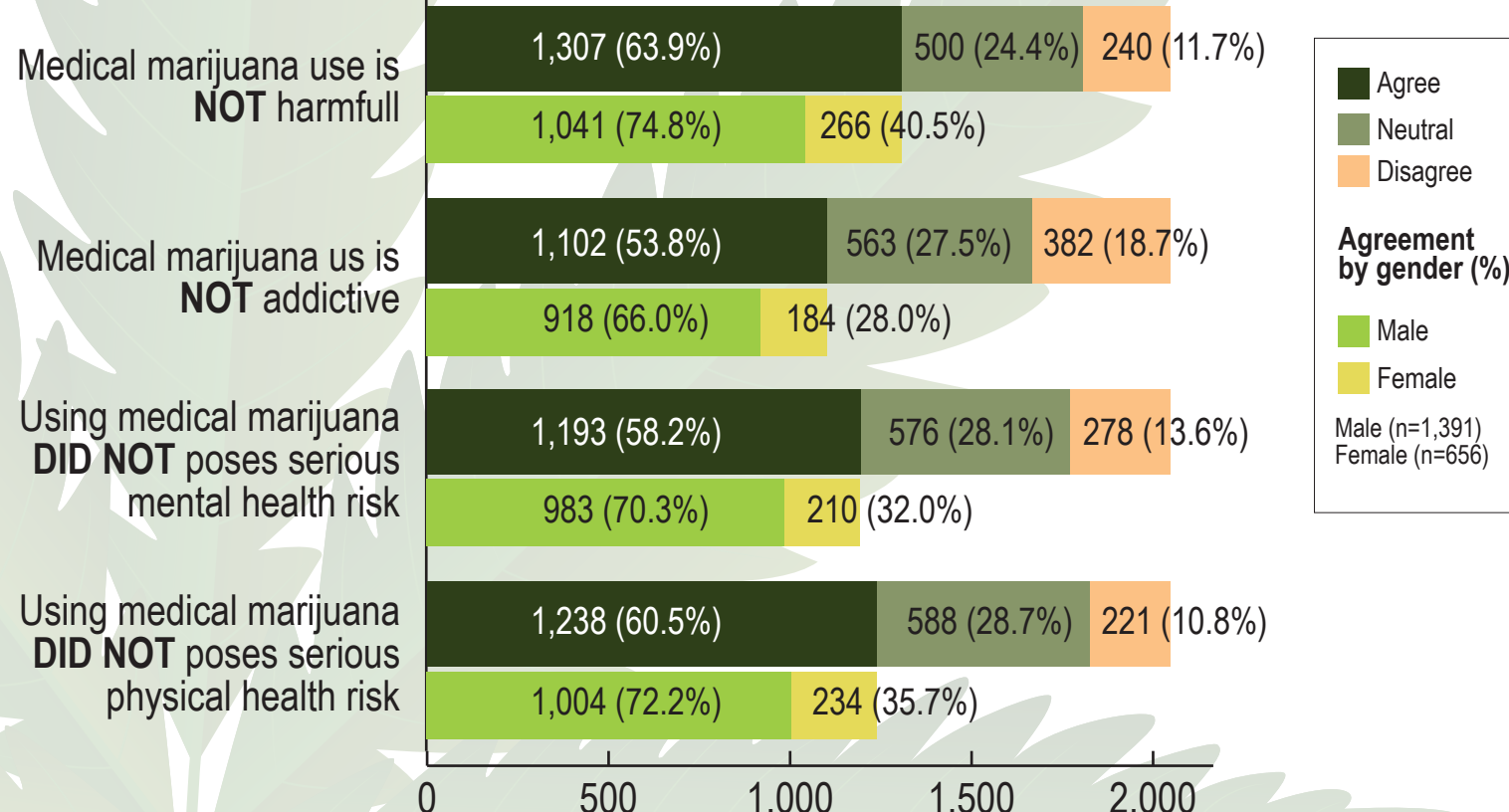
Male respondents were consistently more likely than female respondents to believe that medical marijuana use is safe.

RISK PERCEPTIONS ON MEDICAL MARIJUANA USE BY PEOPLE AGED 18 AND ABOVE

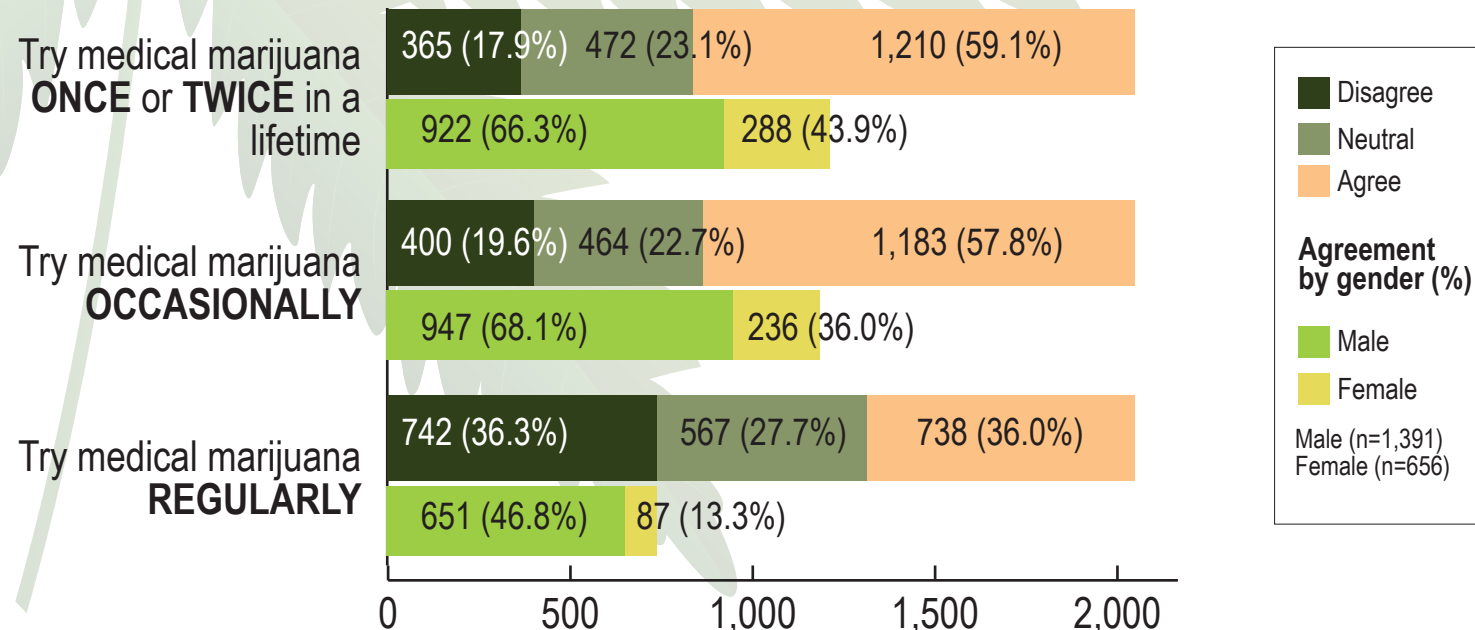
Based on the findings, the level of agreement among females shows a decrease as the frequency of medical marijuana use increases

Male respondents still had a more favourable attitude toward medical marijuana usage than females
